> To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council Moorhead, Minnesota

Dear Council Members:

The 1976 Fire Department Annual Report represents the combined efforts and cooperation of all members of the Department.

The total fire loss for 1976 amounted to \$147,072.00. This is a decrease of \$119,468.00 or 45% less than in 1975. The total number of alarms answered in 1976 was 338, an increase over last year of 5%.

The largest single loss occured on Sept. 5,1976 at the Farmers Home Grocery, at a loss of \$64,000.00. Captain Larry Schons and Firefighter Lyle Gernand were hospitalize with burns from an expplosion that took place during the fire. Capt. Schons was off duty for about 3 weeks.

There were no fire deaths in 1976.

Some of the high-lites of the past year are as follows:

- a. The new emergency call number 911 went into effect on March 22,1976. We have been satisfied with the new system, however we still recieve approximately 37% of our emergency calls over 233-1501, because of a misprint in the Phone book and people having the old number still posted near by.
- b. The City of Moorhead passed an ordinance adopting the Minnesota Uniform Fire Code.
- c. In April the Fire Department started a Blood Pressure Screening Program. Blood pressures are given by our Emergency Medical Technicians on Saturdays and Mondays. Approximately 883 persons used this services in the last 8 months of 1976.
- d. In April last year, the City was inspected for its municipal fire defenses by the Insurance Service Offices. On September 28, 1976 the City of Moorhead was notified that the new fire



insurance classification is Class 4, formerly a graded Class 5 applied. This represents an improvement of one numerical fire insurance classification.Listed below are Cities in the Class 3 and Class 4, all others rated class 5 to class 10.

Last year we graduated three more men as Emergency Medical Technicians, Don Bradlien, Ray Kline, Gary Haaland, making a total of 12 now registered and three more now attending classes.

With the help of the Clay County Safety Council, we sent out 911 telephone stickers to all Moorhead households.

The training and Fire Prevention reports are stated separately in this annual report.

I want to thank Mayor Hoberg and the City Council, and a special thank you to the members of the Public Safety Committee, for their help and direction they have given us in the past year.

The Fire Prevention Bureau continued to make progress in the area of fire safety during 1976. We gained slightly in the number of man hours and inspections from the previous year. A new fire safety program was developed and introduced into the Elementary schools of District # 152 at the fourth grade level.

Fire prevention inspections are conducted mainly in commercial and industrial buildings, apartment houses, schools, churches, day care centers, nursing homes, rest homes, and in private homes if requested.

As of June 1976, 62 million dollars of property in commercial, industrial and apartment buildings was on the tax rolls. This 62 million dollars does not include personal property or inventory stock. Fire loss in these areas was \$86,000. This fire loss might very well be higher without routine fire inspections and corrections of violations.

The fire safety program in the schools is set up as a 7 day unit to be correlated with the existing health program. It is intended to have a permanent place in the curriculum. The program is introduced by fire officials in a 45 minute session. The classroom teacher then uses the prepared textbook/workbook with the students and administers a test at the end of the unit. At the final session, we show the students a movie and present certificates. One requirement in the unit is that the students with their parents conduct a home inspection and discuss an exiting plan for their home. This program was funded by contributions from the VFW Auxiliary.

After the 911 emergency number was approved, I felt it necessary that all city residents have the number close by their phone. It was possible for me to have the 911 tabs printed up through donations by the Clay County Safety Council. These tabs were mailed out to all city residents with their monthly light bills.

The total man hours spent in fire prevention was 2,008 hours of which 1,741 were mine. Two hundred sixty seven hours were divided by 3 men who work off of shift duty. I feel that more man hours and inspections must be made to have a more productive Bureau.

The City of Moorhead is expanding and with more buildings being constructed, there are more inspections that need to be made. I strongly believe the Fire Prevention Bureau is in need of another full time inspector. The Minnesota State Fire Marshall's Office feels that one full time inspector is equal to one pumper and a crew.

#### TRAINING REPORT 1976

In 1976 our Department totaled 675 hours of instruction in the form of evolutions and classroom training. This training was given to each of our three shifts, therefore each shift received around 225 hours of instructions. The breakdown of this training is as follows:

The 675 hours shown here are actual hours of training, therefore to arrive at the manhours we would have to multiply by 10, as there is 10 men on each shift, and we would come up with 6,750 man hours of training. In December we introduced a mandatory physical fitness program for all firefighters, which requires one hour of physical fitness each day, which we feel will make our department a little more physically fit and able to perform its firefighting duties to a higher degree. This report does not take into concideration the on the job training given by each officer to the men who work on his shift, as it is his responsibility to see that each man under his command continually practices and masters the requirements needed to be a good firefighter.
