
Philosophy of the Moorhead Fire Department

No staffing changes for 2007





Mercury spill at Minnesota State University, Moorhead June 19th, 2007



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Part III: BREAKDOWN OF STRUCTURE FIRES AND OTHER FIRES AND INCIDENTS

NOTES FROM 2007

- State Fire Marshal Division The 2006 Legislative session passed new carbon monoxide law requiring CO alarms in all single family homes and multifamily apartment units. Effective January 1, 2007, all newly constructed single family homes and multifamily dwelling units for which building permits were issued on or after January 1,2007 shall be provided with approved carbon monoxide alarms.
- Hazmat: Submitted a Request for Proposal for Chemical Assessment Team March, 2007.
- Gunflint Trail Fire / Eveleth Fire on standby to deploy May, 2007 (did not end up deployed)
- 2007 Minnesota State Fire Code Adopted by City Ordinance August 20, 2017
- Adopt the Clay County All Hazard Mitigation Plan September 17, 2007
- Fire Ops 101 October 4, 2007. Four different hands-on training elements: Auto Extrication, Medical, Hazmat and Live Burn.
- Fire Department Open House October 7, 2007
- Moorhead Fire Department received the 2006 Life Safety Achievement Award October 1, 2007. This award is in recognition of the department's fire prevention activities and no fire deaths occurring for a calendar year.
