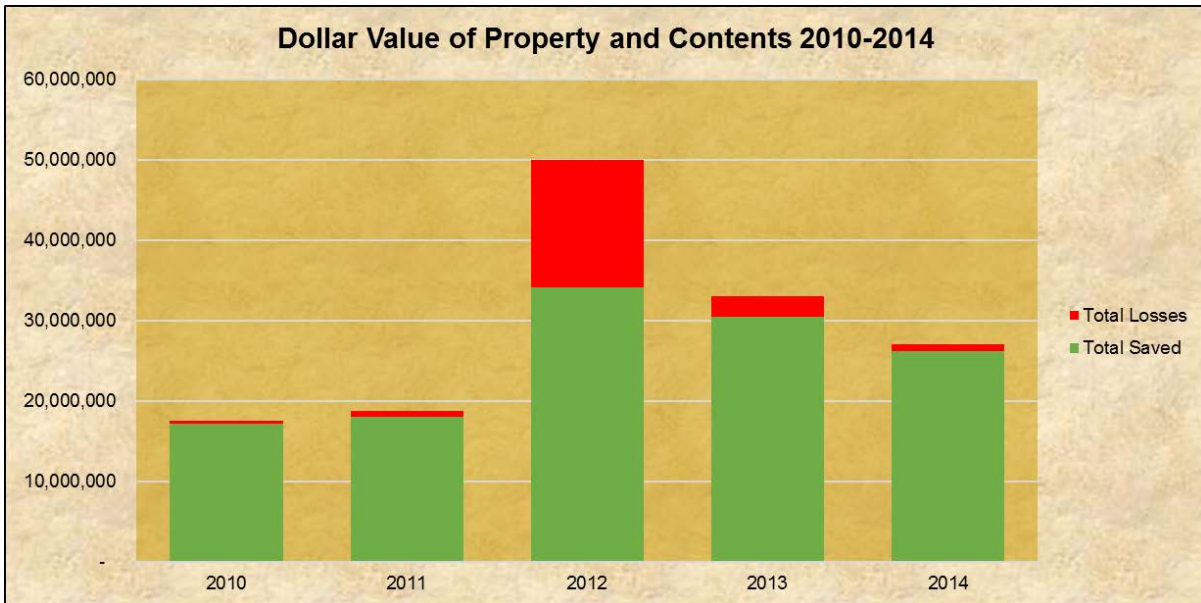
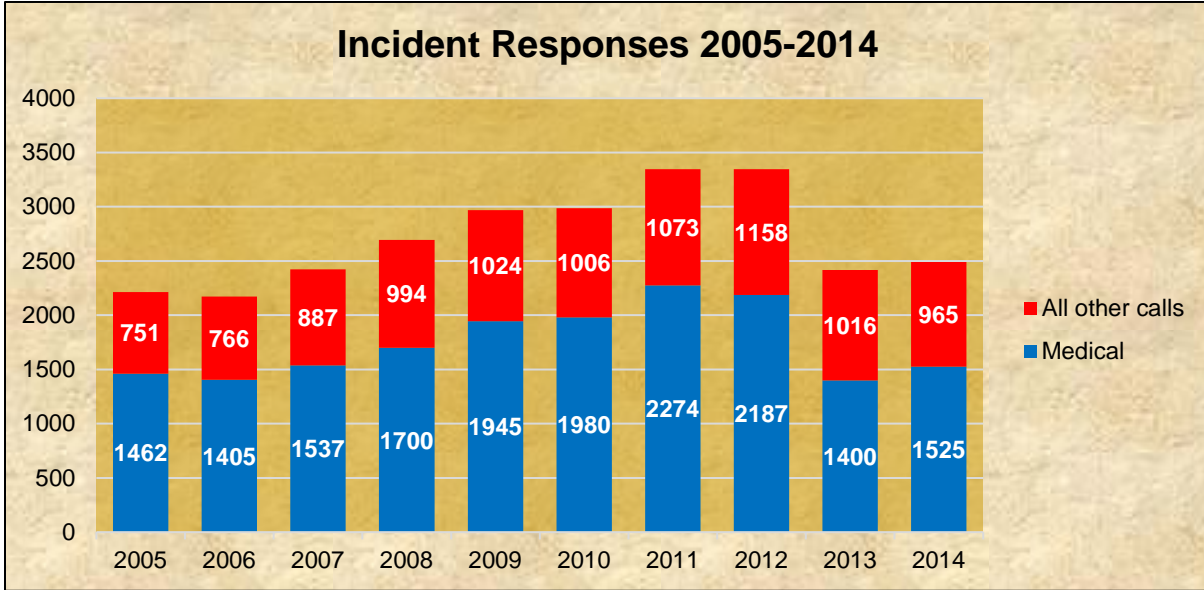

SUPPRESSION REPORT

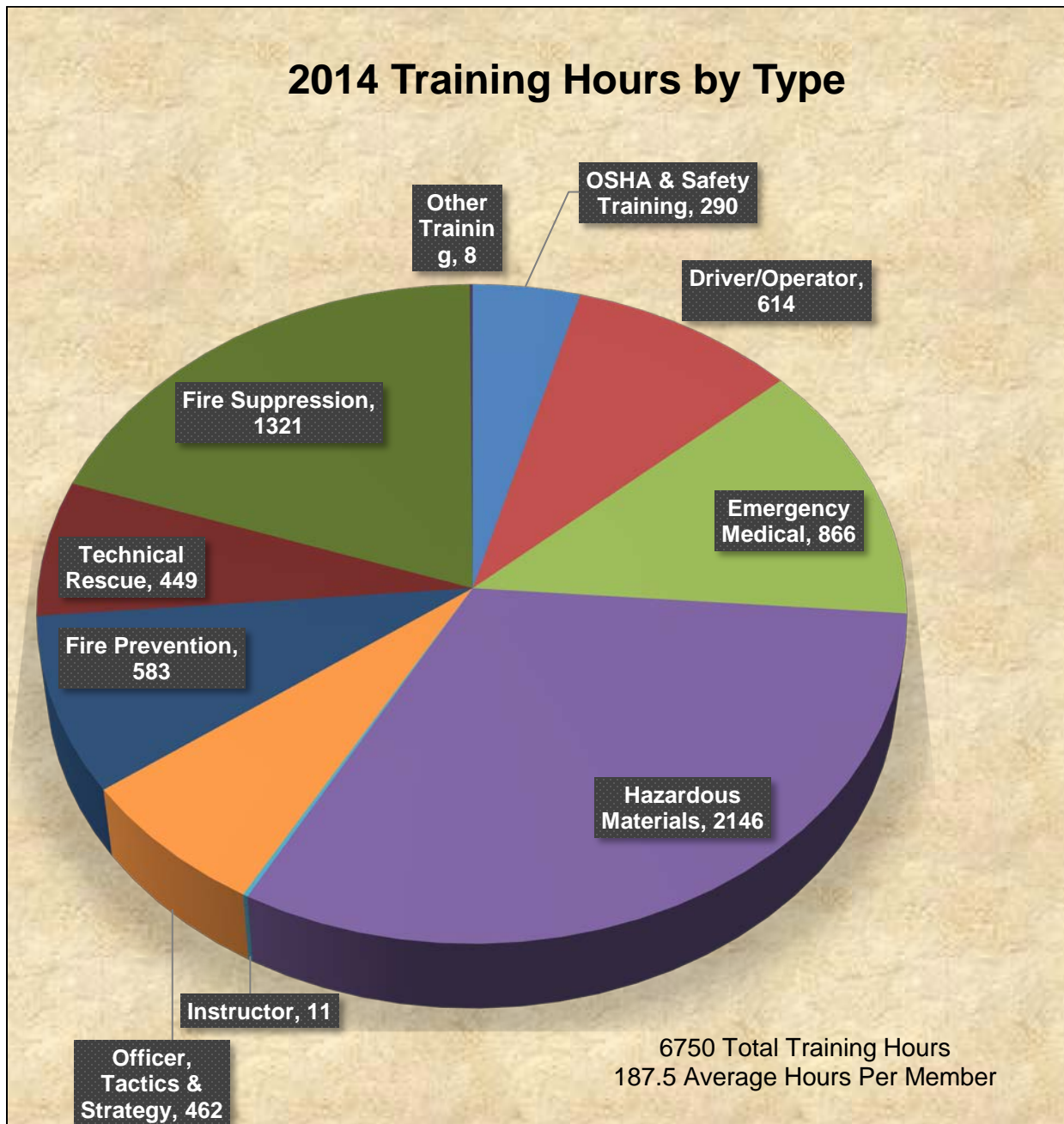

- Hazmat
 - Awarded 2013 State Homeland Security Grant (01/01/2014-12/31/2014) for \$10,000 to provide Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, Etiology (CBRNE) incident planning, training and exercises and to provide equipment for the Hazmat Team,. January 27, 2014
 - 2013 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) (04/01/2014-09/30/2014) Awarded \$11,975.00 (80% State for \$9,580 and 20% Hazmat for \$2,395) for Hazmat members to attend four day Hazmat Conference in Baltimore, MD, April 2014
 - State of Minnesota Public Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management Two Year Contract (10/01/2012 through 09/30/2014) for \$45,000.00 each year for the Hazmat Team.
